Recycling: NESPRESSO: Many of you will have a Nespresso coffee pod machine at home, in your caravan or holiday home. The used pods are recyclable, but in the past the only way to do this was to return them to the Rundle Mall Store (most inconvenient for most of us). Well, the Visitor Centre now has a recycling box for used pods. Only the Nespresso pods can be collected. The reason for this is that they are made entirely from Aluminium (unlike some other brands, apparently). You can collect your pods in any sort of container, which can be placed in the box, but when you order or purchase your next coffee pods, check out the recycling bag sold by Nespresso.

As I indicated previously, I would try a Nespresso recycling bag when I next ordered my coffee pods. Well, I have and it works for me. I bought a few extra so if you would like to try one, pop in and see me. They cost 50c each.

A reminder that newspapers (dry, flat-packed and tied with string) can be placed in the covered trailer in the Tidy Towns yard adjacent to the Visitor Centre. It is important to recycle as much as we can to reduce the amount of rubbish going into landfill so if you are unable to deliver your papers to the yard please place in your yellow recycle bin.

Stansbury also has a bottle and can recycling depot "Stansbury Recycling" for all your refundable items. Alternatively, they can be placed in the "cages" dotted around town and the blue and yellow bins in the Caravan Parks, the proceeds of which are collected and the funds distributed to community groups.

The Visitor Information Centre has a "Planet Ark" recycling box for all your used printer cartridges.

A limited number of the "Scribble" is printed and made available from the town businesses and the Visitor Centre. For those who prefer, it is available to read online at www.stansburysa.com or, if you miss out and don't have internet access, you can always come into the Visitor Information Centre and pick up a copy.

STANSBURY MUSEUM By Ann Brown

The Annual General Meeting of the Stansbury was held at the Museum on Friday 21st July, and it was nice to see some new people in attendance. A big thankyou to the people who have provided different sized Anvils to the Museum to be incorporated in our Blacksmith's display- WANTED We are also seeking an old wooden work bench to be added into this display, the older the better, and it doesn't have to be in good condition either, about 2- 2 1/2 metres long and about waist high. Does anyone have such an item in their shed that they would be willing to part with? The President's 2016-2017 Annual Report is as follows

Our year has been busy but we have been able to complete quite a few projects. The Shed now has a milking exhibit set up with a milking machine, separator, plus many other items used over the years in that industry. A variety of different tools have been cleaned and added to the Motor display.

Hours of work has resulted in The Bottle shop and Dining room being repainted and revamped. There have been additions to the different collections and these have proved a real interest to young and old. We now have many dolls wearing international costumes. Our toys create an extra interest, as does the camera display. Our wooden floors now have an extra shine after being waxed. The new signs make it easier for visitors to identify displays.

The pigeons create a problem to our rain water and due to health regulations it was necessary to upgrade the plumbing in the main building. This included having a filter system for drinking water. The Committee decided that a new toilet and an instant hot water service be installed at the same time. All of the volunteers really appreciate these upgrades. The rain water from the shed continues to be used in the toilets at the school.

We had visitors from Western Australia that were sourcing family information and to assist we asked local identities to locate old farms and other places. This exchange adds to the information that we add to our records. These types of enquiries are growing and take quite a bit of research from members.

During the year the Little Glory Church closed and we have managed to put a display in the history room of many of the items. Items from well known farming families have been donated and these were collected and are now on display. General maintenance and cleaning is ongoing and people often remark on the cleanliness of the whole museum. We have caught up on the backlog of cataloguing of items. This will allow time to process donated items as we receive them and for other outstanding projects.

For 6 months of the year we fundraise and this allows us to continue to open and grow. The food stall at the seaside markets are our main income source and it takes all the committee members plus extra volunteers to operate successfully. Anzac Day breakfast is also an annual event. The long weekend in October and Easter craft fairs have been held for many years but due to lack of helpers we will no longer be able to continue. To all those who have been involved thank you. To the Stansbury Progress Committee for their support of this event, a special thank you. An extra fundraiser was a visit of 80 members from the Historic Commercial Vehicles Club. Morning tea was provided at the museum followed by a look through the museum. A luncheon of sandwiches and sweets at the Institute supper room proved to be a great success and resulted in an extra donation. Committee members still collect the bottles and cans from the caravan parks.

An added special attraction this year we had a free Children's Day during the summer holidays. This proved very popular with the children and their parents and will be an annual event. A leaflet drop at the caravan parks and helped increase our museum visitor numbers and will hopefully continue. Our visit to Elanora was enjoyed by the residents and us. Their stories and memories of using many of items, we had on display, was special. We were also invited to give a talk to the Legacy Ladies with the same results.

As well as our updated web page we are now on Facebook. The Stansbury Information Centre has also added us as an attraction to their website which gives us more publicity. Using these avenues add to our public profile.
